# **Travel information to Pollock Halls at Edinburgh University**

**Location**: Pollock Halls is situated south of the city centre, close to the Scottish Parliament, and within walking distance of the famous Royal Mile. Set in the shadow of Arthur's Seat at Holyrood Park it is conveniently located to explore Scotland's Capital.

**Trains:** Edinburgh's principal railway terminus is Waverly Station, less than 15 minutes walk from the University. A taxi to the University will cost around £6. Trains from the West Coast or from Glasgow will also stop at Haymarket station, at the west end of Princes St. GNER trains travel up the east coast line. www.gner.co.uk, 08457 225 225 tickets or 08457 484 950 for enquiries. **By Coach/Bus**: Coaches arrive in St Andrews Square located almost directly across Princes St from the Waverley Train Station. St Andrews Square is a 20 minute walk from the University. Buses travelling past Pollock Halls (stopping at the Royal Commonwealth Pool) include 30, 33, 2, 14 and 86. There are frequent services from London Victoria Bus Station to Edinburgh. **By car:** As you approach Edinburgh take the City by-pass (A720). Exit at Sheriffhall Roundabout, take the A7 and head for the city centre. Stay on the A7 which becomes Dalkeith Road. Turn right at the Royal Commonwealth Pool onto Holyrood Park Road (approximately 4 miles) and the entrance to Pollock Halls is approximately 200m on the right.

Parking: At Pollock Halls this is free and is allocated on a first come first served basis.

#### **Campus Facilities @ Pollock Halls**

Within the newly refurbished John McIntyre Conference Centre there is a small convenience store with a cash machine and a public bar and restaurant. There is a taxi rank on site with a free phone line, and free car and coach parking. They're also **located** close to the University's Centre for Sport and Exercise.
