14:00	14:30	Below 10,000 Feet Rob Tomlinson, RGN, East Lancashire Hospitals NHS Trust <i>East Lancashire Hospitals NHS Trust has demonstrated that treating staff with respect after a never event creates an open culture that encourages problem solving and service improvement. This approach has allowed the trust to be the first in the UK to launch the aviation influenced language tool 'Below Ten Thousand'. The concept was introduced after several never events and went on to be identified as outstanding practice by the CQC and win a national patient safety award.
